### I. Description

### • The Assay System •

This assay utilizes proprietary non-human cells engineered to provide constitutive, high-level expression of the **Dog Pregnane X Receptor** (nr1i2), a ligand-dependent transcription factor commonly referred to as **PXR**. PXR is also known as the Steroid and Xenobiotic sensing nuclear receptor (**SXR**).

INDIGO's Reporter Cells express a hybrid form of dog PXR. The N-terminal sequence encoding the PXR DNA binding domain (DBD) has been substituted with that of the yeast GAL4-DBD. The native PXR ligand binding domain (LBD) and other C-terminal domains remain intact and functional. Ligand interaction activates the receptor, causing it to bind to the GAL4 DNA binding sequence, which is functionally linked to a resident luciferase reporter gene. Thus, quantifying changes in luciferase activity in the treated reporter cells provides a sensitive surrogate measure of the changes in PXR activity. The principal application of this reporter kit is in the screening of test samples to quantify any functional activity, either agonist or antagonist, that they may exert against dog PXR.

Dog PXR Reporter Cells are prepared using INDIGO's proprietary **CryoMite<sup>TM</sup>** process. This cryo-preservation method yields exceptional cell viability post-thaw, and provides the convenience of immediately dispensing healthy, division-competent reporter cells into assay plates. There is no need for cumbersome intermediate treatment steps such as spin-and-rinse of cells or viability determinations prior to assay setup.

INDIGO Bioscience's Nuclear Receptor Assays are all-inclusive cell-based assay systems. In addition to dog PXR Reporter Cells, this kit provides two optimized media for use during cell culture and in diluting the user's test samples, a reference agonist, Luciferase Detection Reagent, and a cell culture-ready assay plate.

### ■ The Assay Chemistry ■

INDIGO's cell-based assay format capitalizes on the extremely low background, high-sensitivity, and broad linear dynamic range of bio-luminescence reporter gene technology.

Reporter Cells incorporate the cDNA encoding beetle luciferase, a 62 kD protein originating from the North American firefly (*Photinus pyralis*). Luciferase catalyzes the mono-oxidation of D-luciferin in a Mg<sup>+2</sup>-dependent reaction that consumes O<sub>2</sub> and ATP as co-substrates, and yields as products oxyluciferin, AMP, PP<sub>i</sub>, CO<sub>2</sub>, and photon emission. Luminescence intensity of the reaction is quantified using a luminometer, and is reported in terms of Relative Light Units (RLU's).

INDIGO's assay kits feature a luciferase detection reagent specially formulated to provide stable light emission between 5 and 90+ minutes after initiating the luciferase reaction. Incorporating a 5 minute reaction-rest period ensures that light emission profiles attain maximal stability, thereby allowing assay plates to be processed in batch. By doing so, the signal output from all sample wells, from one plate to the next, may be directly compared within an experimental set.

### Preparation of Test Compounds

Test compounds are typically solvated at high-concentration in DMSO and stored frozen as master stocks. Immediately prior to setting up an assay, the master stocks are serially diluted using **Compound Screening Medium (CSM**; as described in *Step 7*) to achieve the desired assay concentrations. Do <u>not</u> use DMSO to further dilute test compound solutions. This method of dilution avoids the significant adverse effects of introducing high concentrations of DMSO into the assay. The final concentration of total DMSO carried over into assay reactions should *never* exceed 0.4%.

*NOTE:* CSM is formulated to help stabilize hydrophobic test compounds in the aqueous environment of the assay mixture. Nonetheless, high concentrations of extremely hydrophobic test compounds diluted in CSM may lack long-term stability and/or solubility, especially if further stored at low temperatures. Hence, it is recommended that test compound dilutions are prepared in CSM immediately prior to assay setup, and are considered to be 'single-use' reagents.

#### Considerations for Automated Dispensing

When processing a small number of assay plates, first carefully consider the dead volume requirement of your dispensing instrument before committing assay reagents to its setup. In essence, "dead volume" is the volume of reagent that is dedicated to the instrument plumbing; it will *not* be available for final dispensing into assay wells. The following Table provides information on reagent volume requirements, and available excesses.



NOTE: This PXR assay protocol includes Day 1 steps and dispensed volumes that differ from the historical protocol that some users may be accustomed to; please review the assay workflow, below.

In brief, 200 µl of Reporter Cells are dispensed into wells of the assay plate and pre-incubated for 4-6 hours. Following the pre-incubation period, culture media are discarded and 200 µl/well of the prepared 1x-concentration treatment media are added. Following 22-24 hr incubation, treatment media are discarded and Luciferase Detection Reagent is added. The intensity of light emission (in units of 'Relative Light Units'; RLU) from each assay well is quantified using a plate-reading luminometer.

### Assay Performance

# Dog PXR (nr1i2) Agonist Assays




Figure 2. Agonist dose-response analyses of Dog PXR.

Performance of the Dog PXR assay using the reference agonists Hyperforin dicyclohexylammonium (provided), Rifampicin, TO901317(Cayman Chemical), and SR12813 (Tocris). Luminescence was quantified using a GloMax-Multi+ luminometer (Promega). Average relative light units (RLU) and corresponding standard deviation (SD) values were determined for each treatment concentration ( $n \ge 6$ ). Fold-activation and Z' values were calculated as described by Zhang, *et al.* (1999)<sup>1</sup>. Non-linear regression and EC<sub>50</sub> analyses were performed using GraphPad Prism software. High Z' scores confirm the robust performance of this assay.

$$Z' = 1 - [3*(SD^{Control} + SD^{Background}) / (RLU^{Control} - RLU^{Background})]$$

### II. Product Components & Storage Conditions

This dog PXR Assay kit contains materials to perform assays in a single 96-well assay plate.

The aliquot of dog PXR Reporter Cells is provided as a single-use reagent. Once thawed, reporter cells can NOT be refrozen or maintained in extended culture with any hope of retaining downstream assay performance. Therefore, extra volumes of these reagents should be discarded after assay setup.

Assay kits are shipped on dry ice. Upon receipt, individual kit components may be stored at the temperatures indicated on their respective labels. Alternatively, the entire kit may be further stored at -80°C.

To ensure maximal viability, Reporter Cells must be maintained at -80°C until immediately prior to use.

The date of product expiration is printed on the Product Qualification Insert (PQI) enclosed with each kit.

### III. Materials to be Supplied by the User

The following materials must be provided by the user, and should be made ready prior to initiating the assay procedure:

#### DAY 1

- cell culture-rated laminar flow hood.
- 37°C, humidified 5% CO<sub>2</sub> incubator for mammalian cell culture.
- 37°C water bath.
- 70% alcohol wipes
- 8- or 12-channel electronic, repeat-dispensing pipettes & sterile tips
- disposable media basins, sterile.
- sterile multi-channel media basins (such as the Heathrow Scientific "Dual-Function Solution Basin"), *or* deep-well plates, *or* appropriate similar vessel for generating dilution series of reference compound(s) and test compound(s).
- Optional: antagonist reference compound.
- Optional: clear 96-well assay plate, cell culture ready, for viewing cells on Day 2.

# IV. Assay Protocol

Review the entire Assay Protocol before starting. Completing the assay requires an overnight incubation. *Steps 1-11* are performed on **Day 1**, requiring less than 2 hours of bench work and a 4 hr incubation step to complete. *Steps 12-17* are performed on **Day 2**, and require less than 1 hour to complete.

### A word about Antagonist-mode assay setup

Receptor inhibition assays expose the Reporter Cells to a constant, sub-maximal concentration (typically between  $EC_{50}-EC_{85}$ ) of a known agonist AND the test compound(s) to be evaluated for antagonist activity. This assay kit includes a 2.0 mM stock solution of **Hyperforin**, a potent activator of dog PXR that may be used to setup antagonist-mode assays. 400 nM Hyperforin approximates  $EC_{50}$  in this cell-based assay. Hence, it presents a reasonable assay concentration of agonist to be used when screening test compounds for inhibitory activity to dog PXR.

We find that adding the challenge agonist to a bulk volume of CSM, at the desired final assay concentration, is the most efficient and precise method of setting up antagonist assays, and it is the method presented in *Step 7b* of the following protocol.

**DAY 1 Assay Protocol:** All steps must be performed using aseptic technique.

- **1.)** Remove the **2 tubes** of **Cell Recovery Medium (CRM)** from freezer storage, thaw and equilibrate to <u>37°C</u> using a water bath.
- **2.) Rapid Thaw of the Reporter Cells:** *First*, retrieve the two tubes of **CRM** from the 37°C water bath and sanitize their outside surfaces with a 70% ethanol swab.

Second, retrieve the tube of **Reporter Cells** from -80°C storage and, without delay, perform a rapid thaw of the frozen cells by transferring 9.5 ml from each of the 2 tubes of 37°C CRM into the tube of frozen cells. Place the tube of Reporter Cells in a 37°C water bath for 5 - 10 minutes. The resulting volume of cell suspension will be 21 ml.

- **3.)** Retrieve the tube of Reporter Cell Suspension from the water bath and sanitize the outside surface with a 70% alcohol swab.
- **4.)** Gently invert the tube of Reporter Cells several times to disperse cell aggregates and gain a homogenous cell suspension. Transfer the cell suspension into a reservoir. Using an 8-chanel pipette, dispense  $200~\mu l$  / well of cell suspension into the assay plate.
  - *NOTE 4.1:* Increased well-to-well variation (= increased standard deviation!) will occur if care is not taken to prevent cells from settling during the dispensing period. Likewise, take care to dispense uniform volumes across the assay plate.
  - *NOTE 4.2:* Users sometimes wish to examine the reporter cells using a microscope. If so, the extra volume of cell suspension provided with each kit may be dispensed into a clear 96-well cell culture treated assay plate. Continue to process the assay plate in identical manner to the white assay plate.
- **5.) Pre-incubate reporter cells:** Place the assay plate into a  $37^{\circ}$ C,  $\geq 85\%$  humidity, 5% CO<sub>2</sub> incubator for 4 6 hours.

Near the end of the 4-6 hour pre-incubation period:

- **6.)** Remove **Compound Screening Medium (CSM)** from freezer storage and thaw in a 37°C water bath.
- 7.) Prepare the Test Compound and Reference Compound treatment media at the desired final assay concentrations: Use CSM to prepare an appropriate dilution series of the reference and test compound stocks. Prepare all treatment media at the desired final assay concentrations. In *Step 9*, the prepared treatment media will be dispensed at 200  $\mu$ l / well into the assay plate. Manage dilution volumes carefully; this assay kit provides 45 ml of CSM.

NOTE: Total DMSO carried over into assay reactions should never exceed 0.4%.

*a. Agonist*-mode assays. This Assay kit includes a 2.0 mM stock solution of Hyperforin, an activator of dog PXR. The following 7-point treatment series, prepared in serial 2-fold decrements, provides a suitable dose-response: 2000, 1000, 500, 250, 125, 75, and 37.5 nM, and including a 'no treatment' control. **APPENDIX 1** provides an example for generating such a dilution series.

- **b.** Antagonist-mode assays. When setting antagonist assays, first supplement a bulk volume of CSM with the challenge agonist Hyperforin to achieve the desired final assay-concentration (refer to "A word about antagonist-mode assay setup", pg. 7). The agonist-supplemented CSM is then used to generate dilutions of test compound samples to achieve their final assay concentrations.
- **8.)** At the end of the cell pre-incubation period: Discard the culture media by ejecting it into an appropriate waste container. *Gently* tap the inverted plate onto a clean absorbent paper towel to remove residual droplets. Cells will remain tightly adhered to well bottoms.
- 9.) Dispense 200  $\mu$ l of each treatment media into appropriate wells of the assay plate.
- **10.**) Transfer the assay plate into a 37°C, humidified 5% CO<sub>2</sub> incubator for <u>22 24 hours</u>.

  NOTE: Ensure a high-humidity (≥ 85%) environment within the cell culture incubator. This is critical to prevent the onset of deleterious "edge-effects" in the assay plate.
- **11.**) For greater convenience on Day 2, retrieve **Detection Substrate** *and* **Detection Buffer** from freezer storage and place them in a dark refrigerator (4°C) to thaw overnight.

- **DAY 2 Assay Protocol:** Subsequent manipulations do *not* require special regard for aseptic technique, and may be performed on a bench top.
- **12.)** 30 minutes before intending to quantify receptor activity, remove **Detection Substrate** and **Detection Buffer** from the refrigerator and place them in a low-light area so that they may equilibrate to room temperature. Once at room temperature, gently invert each tube several times to ensure homogenous solutions.
  - *NOTE:* Do NOT actively warm Detection Substrate above room temperature. If these solutions were not allowed to thaw overnight at 4°C, a room temperature water bath may be used to expedite thawing.
- 13.) Set the plate-reader to "luminescence" mode. Set the instrument to perform a single  $\underline{5}$  second "plate shake" prior to reading the first assay well. Read time may be set to 0.5 second (500 mSec) per well, *or less*.
- **14.**) *Immediately before proceeding to Step 15*, transfer the entire volume of Detection Buffer into the vial of Detection Substrate, thereby generating a <u>12 ml</u> volume of **Luciferase Detection Reagent (LDR)**. Mix gently to avoid foaming.
- **15.**) Following 22 24 hours incubation in treatment media, retrieve the assay plate from the incubator. Discard all media contents by ejecting it into an appropriate waste container. *Gently* tap the inverted plate onto a clean absorbent paper towel to remove residual droplets. Cells will remain tightly adhered to well bottoms.
- **16.)** Add  $\underline{100 \, \mu l}$  of **LDR** to each well of the assay plate. Allow the assay plate to rest at room temperature for at least  $\underline{5 \, \text{minutes}}$  following the addition of LDR. Do not shake the assay plate during this period.
- **17.**) Quantify luminescence.
